The Ride & Stride September 13th, 2025

Most counties in England hold an annual 'Ride & Stride', on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for church restoration and repair. The idea is that cyclists and walkers are given a list of churches and chapels in the area of their choice. They map out their own route to pedal or walk to places of Christian worship having arranged to be sponsored by friends for a fixed sum or donation per church visited.

The money that is collected is divided in two. Half goes to the church or chapel of the cyclist's or walker's choice, the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need. The Trust looks more favourably on applications from supporters of the Ride & Stride event. In the twenty-five years that Ride & Stride has been running in Surrey, over £500,000 has been raised.

The Trust, whose trustees are from most Christian denominations, runs the annual event in Surrey, supported by a dozen or so Area Organisers. These organisers give support to Church Organisers, providing the paperwork and any guidance they need for preserving our precious heritage.

Ride & Stride is a fun way to spend time on a pleasant Saturday in September while getting to know some Surrey places of Christian worship and raising funds for this worthy cause. Why not make up a group and join in this year! Some suggested routes are available from the SCPT website. Ask your Church Organiser for lists of participating churches and chapels together with sponsorship forms.

Supporters who prefer not to 'ride or stride', please consider sponsoring volunteers involved in this important event. In addition, joining the Trust costs very little and contributes to its vital work.

An Ever-Thankful Oldie

I do not really have pew, From which to form a thoughtful "view" My place is movable, each week And so, my view is quite unique. From floor to chair, from cushion to pew, From lectern to Centre from aisle too, A church that's full of God's great light, It fills me with such great delight! I love to be in church on a Sunday morning a little early if I can. If I catch the 8:00er's as they have their coffee, I am always welcomed with a "good morning" and the offer of a cup. As I potter around setting up my things for the 10:00 service, I hear the conversations flow. They talk about what they have heard in the service, discussing difference of opinion with interest and respect, they ask after one another's health and wellbeing, they share together their troubles and worries. Then I see the care that is taken over packing away, returning the service sheets, washing up the cups, helping people back to their cars, making sure each person is cared for. God's love in action- what a joy to be part of a church like this.

Then comes in the next shift- the 10:00'ers begin to arrive. Those who have volunteered to help set up, hand out books, put up the hymn numbers, serve tea and coffee- all arriving to make sure this is a welcoming place when the rest of the congregation arrive. And arrive they do! From the people who arrive early to those who tumble in a little late. The church begins to fill as I see hand-shakes, high fives and hugs taking place. Other churches only talk to the people who sit left and right of them but not here at St John's! People go out of their way (and out of their pew!) to talk to each other. This church understands building community, this church understands how to welcome people, and it understands that it is a whole church responsibility. I am not saying we ALWAYS get EVERYTHING right but this is a wonderful church of people who give it everything they have, to help people feel the Love of God - what a privilege to be part of a church like this. The service begins... children are excited to hear what we are doing today, adults are settling in to be spiritually fed and together we worship. We don't all worship in the same way- some are loud, some are quiet, some connect through the music, others the sermon, others the prayers- some stay in their pews, others prefer the carpet, little ones toddle round with a parent in tow- but from wherever we are and whichever service we attend, we worship together. Together in Christ, and when we are invited to share what we have been exploring and learning with the younger members of our congregation at the end, it hits me. I look out at our Church family, I am greeted..... by a sea of grins. The encouragement, the looks of excitement and shared pleasure in seeing others get to know Jesus..... oh, what fun to be part of a church like this!!

Over coffee after the service, people commented that they had not realised how extensive was our work and how many opportunities beyond Sunday morning's there are for talking about God with young people.

We were all given a booklet about the YPMF, the Young People's Ministry Fund. This sets out the status of the Fund and how our gifts this year will enable the work to continue in the long term. If you have not received a copy, please ask a sides person on your next visit to St. John's.

When the fund was launched last year, we set ourselves a five year target of £150,000 to which we have generously contributed £69.000 to date. This year's Gift Sunday appeal is to add another £30,000 to the fund.

GARDENING HINTS FOR JULY

Tomatoes should be watered regularly to prevent Blossom End Rot.

Feed Tomatoes and Dahlias once a week with a high potash feed, except for Bush Tomatoes. All side shoots on Tomatoes need to be removed and the top cut off above the fourth truss to prevent the plant wasting energy producing tomatoes that will not ripen.

Pick Courgettes and Beans regularly to prevent them becoming too big, tough and stringy. Leeks, Brussel Sprouts, Kale, Purple Sprouting and Winter Cabbage should be planted out. Make sowings of Spring Cabbage, Turnip, and for a late crop, French and Runner Beans.

Harvest Autumn planted Onions, Shallots and Garlic.

As the weather pundits are forecasting a drought it is important to keep all containerised plants watered regularly and fed occasional with a liquid feed such as Tomorite or Maxi Crop.

Start dead heading bedding plants for a continuous display. Once you allow them to set seed, they will think that their job is done, and will stop flowering! Roses too should be dead headed and fed with a Rose fertiliser, to produce a good second flush.

House plants need to be watered when the pot feels light, and fed every 2 weeks.

Apply a summer feed to the lawn just before rain is forecast.

Among the most popular foliage plants are Hostas, but they do suffer from problems:-

Slugs and snails affect Hostas more than any other plant. They will enjoy 'midnight feasts' until nothing is left. Growing in pots can provide some protection, when they are stood on copper impregnated mats, or fitted with copper tape bands. Copper tape can also be used in the soil as a barrier around the plant which slugs and snails will be reluctant to cross, or thinly scatter slug pellets around the plants.

Pot grown Hostas can be attacked by Vine Weevil grubs eating the roots. To protect the plant, water with Provado Vine Weevil Killer 2.

Containerised Hostas need to be watered regularly. They are best grown in John Innes No. 3 compost. Feed in spring with a general purpose fertiliser such as Growmore, or Fish, Blood and Bone. Use a liquid feed during the growing season. Divide and re-pot every 2-3 years depending on your plant's vigour.
