Before the month is out, we'll be rolling up our sleeves to get things looking spick and span before Easter with our Big Church Spring Clean on Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> March. If you can spare a bit of time to help dust, polish, tidy or tackle a cobweb or two, it would be hugely appreciated. Many hands really do make light work, and it's always good fun when done together.

Then on Palm Sunday on Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> March we'll be welcoming back Sam the donkey to our 10:00 service as we step into the story of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem. As an extra bonus this year we have Bishop Paul coming to preach as well!

However you choose to keep Lent this year, I hope it brings moments of peace, reflection, and maybe even a little joy along the way.

## VIEWS FROM THE PEWS



The other Sunday I found my eyes lifting beyond the nineteenth century stones of our parish church, not quite to Heaven, but certainly to a vision of our national Anglican communion. Dame Sarah Mullally had just been confirmed as our Archbishop, a glorious first for the church, but with a mitre full of issues facing her when she starts her ministry this month.

Forgive me, whoever was preaching that Sunday in February, but I was asking myself "what do we believers in the pew want her to do?".

Just at that moment, I heard the preacher say, "Don't be afraid to ask Jesus for help" and I thought that's what we want Dame Sarah to do; "Support us (in the pews) to get the message over to friends, newcomers, our street, our community our parish or whoever."

My mind rumbled on and wondered what that meant to me.

I think I would like spiritual support; what Jesus is asking me to do in my daily life and maybe what as a Christian I need to consider on the big social issues of today.

I think I would like my parish church to have more financial support; more resources for parish mission and less for the church superstructure and vanity projects like reparations for long ago sins of slavery.

I think I would like anything that strengthens my faith as a pew dweller and gives resources to our parish church to spread God's Word.

As the preacher ended his sermon with an Amen, I remembered something I read recently; "The church must offer the Living Christ and not just the machinery of religion." Amen to that.

(And I do apologise to our preacher that day).

*And we are spoilt for choice this month with a second view from the pews!*

On the radio this morning two clerics were discussing whether the general synod had rejected services of blessing for same sex couples outright or deferred a decision pending further discussion. Either way any same sex couple is unlikely to receive a positive message from this, especially as the debate has been rumbling on for some years now. Happily, there is a massive disconnect between the agonising in the higher echelons and the cheerful acceptance among the congregations. Unhappily the media reflect the agonising not the acceptance, and this is the message being broadcast to the public. The Synod must uphold canon law and be a stabilising force among the swirling currents of popular ideas. It cannot be easy to discern when the winds of change are fuelled by the power of the Holy Spirit and when they need to be resisted. As lay members we follow the two commandments to love God and to love our neighbour. We are not required to tell anyone else what they should do. Synod members are like all legislators – it's much easier to criticize them than to be them.

## **GARDENING HINTS FOR MARCH**

We have so far been very lucky in not having had any snow just a few heavy frosts but this month, traditionally, is usually very cold so we need to be careful with any tender plants and not to put anything out too soon where it can be killed by frost.

### **Things to do in the garden in March.**

Shallots and Onion Sets should be planted this month and if it is mild Early Potatoes can be planted towards the end of the month.

Most vegetable seed can now be sown outdoors in prepared beds.

If you did not do so last month you can still sow Aubergine, Cucumber, Sweet Peppers and Tomatoes in a heated propagator or indoors.

Cut back last year's autumn fruiting Raspberry canes to ground level, prune Blueberries and Gooseberries and apply a dressing of a balanced fertiliser or Sulphate of Potash at 15g per sq m.

Basal cuttings of Dahlias should be taken this month to provide plants for summer flowering.

Sweet Peas can still be sown in a sheltered position.

Annuals such as Alyssum, Lobelia, and French Marigold should be sown indoors this month.

Remove the top 3" of compost from containers and replace with fresh.

Bush and Standard Roses should be pruned and fed with a Rose Fertiliser.

Continue to prune summer flowering Shrubs and Dogwoods.

Large flowering Clematis which flower in May and June on short shoots from the previous year can have weak and dead stems removed in early Spring before growth begins.

Small flowering species such as "Montana" flower in early Spring on last year's growth, they need minimum pruning but if they begin to exceed their allotted space they should be pruned after flowering.

Large flowering species such as "Jackmanii" which bloom in late summer on the current year's growth should be pruned to a pair of strong buds 15-20cm above soil level before growth begins.

When conditions are dry the lawn should be scarified to remove moss and thatch before cutting with the mower blades on a high setting for the first few cuts,

Weed and Feed with Moss killer should be applied just before rain is forecast.

Slugs and Snails will need to be controlled with sharp sand or slug pellets especially around Delphiniums, Hostas and Lupins as soon as new shoots begin to appear.




**Number of Food Parcels distributed Yearly Comparison**
