




Congratulations to Mavis and John who won the quiz. Maybe you could join us next year!

Action songs, the puppet show, the play, the bible stories (explained with the use of videos, action figures and scenes), the games, the crafts, and our huge band of volunteers, ably lead by Georgie, our Youth & Families Minister.



Feedback coming in from parents and carers say the children loved it! They'd just like more please!!

Holiday Club ran from 9 to 12, 5 mornings last week. It was fully booked (plus a waiting list) so 48 Reception to year 6 children in total! Participation levels were high, loving the range of activities on offer and Georgie's joyous guidance!

Young people who attend our Youth Café and our church ran the teams. To witness these young leaders supporting the younger children by encouraging



them to participate, attentive to their needs, commending them for their contributions, was truly special! They freely gave up their time to help and fully entered into the spirit of things.

Holiday Club provided the opportunity for children in the local community to think, explore and ask questions about what it means to follow Jesus (to understand what being a disciple might look like), and that we are all invited to follow Jesus. The stories focused on Peter, the disciple and his path to following Jesus. Each day, the children were

encouraged to think about how they could be more like Peter. They enjoyed learning a verse from the Bible each day and earned team points if they could remember it at the end of the day.

Parents enjoyed joining in with our 'Mission Control' session on the last day, singing action songs with us. The main hall was buzzing with activity – children showing their parents their team gazebos, named 'Planet Pods' and the tie-dye bags they had made, full of other craft items and goodies!



When the parents and children had left, we started the job of dismantling 'Starship Discovery'. As the rocket was untied from the staircase, and Planet Pods were folded away, the volunteers could be heard humming the songs and sharing their experiences of the week.

On 24th August, Tim and Georgie provided a special All Age Service for everyone who attended Starship Discovery Holiday Club. It was magical to see the entire congregation of all ages joining in the celebration of such a special week!

VIEW FROM THE PEWS



Going to church on a Sunday for many people at St Johns forms an important event during the week and it can be a joyous, and spiritually

uplifting experience providing time to reflect, pray and enjoy communal worship within our friendly congregation.

I am often therefore surprised at the conflicting feelings that I sometimes feel as I sit quietly in my pew with the service about to start.

Here I am, in a peaceful, safe, and caring religious place contemplating the service ahead. Yet I wrestle with a sense of profound sadness and despair that so many other people, in other places of worship, be they churches or makeshift gatherings in war torn regions around the world, are unable to enjoy the (easily underestimated) privilege that we have at St Johns. We are so wonderfully blessed and fortunate to be able to gather in peace to worship without fear of religious persecution, violence, or the ravages of war that now dominate our everyday news. With this juxtaposition comes a sense of guilt, therefore, that we should be so fortunate, whilst huge numbers of peace-loving people around the world are denied the joy that we derive from our gatherings on Sundays.

The sense of being so powerless to help in any meaningful or practical way amidst so much suffering, inequality, starvation and fear causes me to struggle with what should otherwise be a calming, joyful and enriching experience of the service ahead.

We pray, we support our charities and do whatever we can of course, but still I sit there wrestling with my guilt at our good fortune, and the struggle to reconcile our privileged existence.

She was a peasant girl dressed as a boy with her hair cut short......

.....at the head of a mighty army.

I cannot remember exactly when I first heard of Joan of Arc, but I was very young when I read about her life. It was probably in one of the Ladybird books, you know the ones I mean, they were pocket size with a colour picture on the front alongside a red ladybird. She was pictured wearing shining armour and carrying a huge sword and with fluttering banners behind her. She clearly made a strong impression on me and, more than any other Saint, Joan of Arc

is the one that I've never forgotten.

Surprisingly, I had never visited those places in France where she lived and died, so one year, on an annual "pilgrimage", I determined that I would investigate. My journey took me to Rouen where her life ended. A modern style church has been erected next to the place where Joan died. It is circular or semi-circular and the interior, which mirrored its exterior shape, though rather dark was very atmospheric. In alcoves and chapels were stories about Joan and the events leading up to her death. There were elaborate wood carvings depicting the end of her life and some very affecting statues of her. I felt rather sad upon leaving and decided to find out more about her while I was in Rouen. Unfortunately, it was the very day when all the Museums are closed! Nevertheless, I had been to Rouen and seen exactly where she died, which is marked by a plaque next to the church, and as I had started to learn more about Joan, I resolved to return one day and learn more.

The French call her Jeanne D'Arc. Of course, I can always see her in the magnificent stained-glass window we have in St. John's. Her life may have been cut short, but her legend cannot be erased. Joan of Arc lives on.

Aye! It is that!



Most counties in England hold an annual 'Ride & Stride' on the second Saturday in September, to raise money for church restoration and repair. The idea is that cyclists and walkers are given a list of churches and chapels in the area of their choice. They map out their own route to pedal or walk to places of Christian worship having arranged to be

sponsored by friends for a fixed sum or donation per church visited.

The money that is collected is divided in two. Half goes to the church or chapel of the cyclist's or walker's choice, the other half is retained by the Surrey Churches Preservation Trust for distribution to churches in need. The Trust looks more favourably on applications from supporters

of the Ride & Stride event. In the twenty-five years that Ride & Stride has been running in Surrey, over £500,000 has been raised.

The Trust, whose trustees are from most Christian denominations, runs the annual event in Surrey, supported by a dozen or so Area Organisers. These organisers give support to Church Organisers, providing the paperwork and any guidance they need for preserving our precious heritage.

Ride & Stride is a fun way to spend time on a pleasant Saturday in September while getting to know some Surrey places of Christian worship and raising funds for this worthy cause. Why not make up a group and join in this year! Some suggested routes are available from the SCPT website. Ask your Church Organiser for lists of participating churches and chapels together with sponsorship forms.

Supporters who prefer not to 'ride or stride', please consider sponsoring volunteers involved in this important event. In addition, joining the Trust costs very little and contributes to its vital work.

GARDENING HINTS FOR SEPTEMBER

The evenings are now drawing in and Autumn is upon us, so enjoy your garden whilst it is still at its peak!

On dry sunny days (and there are many of those at the moment), seed can be collected from Annuals, such as Alyssum, French Marigold and Tagetes, can be collected for sowing next Spring - do not collect the seed of FI Hybrids, as the new plants will not be the same as the originals.


Continue to deadhead the flower border so that it will stay in bloom until the first frost.

To produce good blooms, Dahlias need to be fed with a high potash liquid feed once a fortnight.

Rambling Roses, which only produce one flush of bloom per year, should be pruned, cutting out a third of the flowered stems at the base of the plant.

Sow Hardy Annuals, such as Calendula and Nigella, to provide early colour next Summer.

Plant Spring flowering biennials, such as Forget-me-not, Foxglove and Iceland Poppy, to produce for early colour in the border.



Cuttings of Fuchsia and Pelargonium can still be taken.

Keep Camellias and Rhododendrons well-watered to ensure good bud formation for flowering next Spring.

Evergreen Hedges should be given a final trim before Winter.

Daffodils and Narcissi should be planted this month or next for a good Spring display.

I expect that, like me, you will already have amassed a collection of bulb catalogues! Although their prices may appear expensive, they offer you

the chance of buying varieties that you will not see in the Garden Centres (remember the bigger the Bulb, the better the flower).

Towards the end of the month, unripened Tomatoes should be brought indoors to ripen or to be made into chutney.

Main crop Potatoes should be lifted and stored for use during the Winter months.

A late sowing of Spinach and Turnip can still be made. Over-



wintering Onion Sets and Spring Cabbage should be planted out.

Cut out the fruited canes of Loganberry and Raspberry.

Apply an Autumn Dressing to the Lawn, if ever rain is forecast again! Do not worry about your Lawn, it will soon pick up if the drought is not too long!

[Editor's Note – some of you have mentioned how much you like Martin's banana bread, which he makes regularly, ie. when I don't eat all the bananas! I include here the recipe in case you'd like to try it!]

MARTIN'S REALLY EASY BUT QUITE POPULAR BANANA BREAD!

Ingredients:

2 very ripe mashed bananas

140g softened butter

140g self-raising flour

140g caster sugar

2 large beaten eggs

1 tsp baking powder

Recipe:

- 1. Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4
- 2. Line a 2lb loaf tin
- 3. Cream butter & sugar until light & fluffy
- 4. Add the eggs and a little of the flour
- 5. Fold in the remaining flour, baking powder and bananas
- 6. Pour mixture into the tin and bake for about 50 minutes
- 7. Cool in the tin for about 10 minutes then move to a wire rack

Cook's tips: I use a stand mixer and a Lakeland loaf tin liner. It is an easy recipe after all!



ABOUT OUR CATHEDRAL



Just by way of update, you will recall that for some considerable time work has been in progress to repair the broken glass pane in one of our Cathedral's main doors. The original pane was apparently broken by a homeless person some time ago. The repair work is being

undertaken by an artist at her home in New Zealand. Apparently, this artist was a pupil of John Hutton who engraved the original main doors to our Cathedral. Hutton, also famous for his work in Coventry Cathedral, engraved our Cathedral doors in the 1960's.

Interestingly, today, I discovered, with the help of a Cathedral guide, some earlier glass etchings also by John Hutton. These etchings are situated above the South Transept Porch doors and depict angels in normal poses and illustrate his earlier technique. These were completed in 1955 and are very different to his music players etched into the main doors. I would not have spotted these etchings unless they had been pointed out to me by the guide. In fact, the South Transept Doors are rarely open and today was the first time I had been through them. Glass engraving or etching is a skill which is sadly diminishing in the world and professional engravers, like our New Zealand lady, are becoming increasingly rare and former John Hutton pupils even rarer. The South Transept main doors also bear flame like engravings about 6 inches tall and 2-3 inches wide at eye level. I have to confess that I could not resist running my fingers over these engravings; the sensation I felt through my fingertips of the smoothness of the plain glass followed by the patterned roughness and depth of the etched glass was a tactile though somewhat guilty delight.

It just proves that in spite of the countless times I've visited our Cathedral there is always something new to discover! The guide told me that her tours of the Cathedral can take at least an hour, longer if she has an audience willing to listen though she added that some visitors find our Cathedral "uninteresting". I made a mental note to join a tour one day soon; after all, you never know, I might even learn something!
