





FROM ST JOHN'S RECTORY

Welcome to the May parish magazine! May is an exciting time for us at St John's because the month includes our Patronal Festival – the day when we remember and give thanks for our patron saint, St. John the Evangelist.

St John the Evangelist's day is actually celebrated on 27th December, however as that date is so close to Christmas and people are often away, we are allowed to move our patronal celebration to the Sunday closest to



the Feast of St John at the Latin gate. This feast is on 6th May (also the rector's birthday!) and the closest Sunday to it this year is 4th May. So on Sunday 4th May please join us for an All Age Worship service at 10am, followed by brunch in the church centre. Thank you so much to the brunch team for all the preparation they will do before the day and for delivering us a fantastic brunch on the day too. It is not to be missed!

St John the Evangelist lived a long life, and as he reached very old age, his disciples had to carry him into church. He was only able to say a few words by this point, and it became his custom to say the same sentence every time he was carried into his local church – "my little children, love one another."

John had been one of the original twelve apostles and so had heard these words directly from Jesus to the twelve. After a while John's friends and followers who had carried him into church plucked up the courage to ask him why he said only one sentence. John replied, "because it is the Lord's commandment, and if only it is kept, it is enough."

At times the Christian life can be hard. We can struggle to live up to all that we feel we should be living up to. Yet when life does feel like this,

and our doubts start to cloud our faith, let us try to hold on to the words of our patron saint — "Love one another. It is the Lord's commandment, and if only it is kept, it is enough."



ST JOHN'S MEN IN FELLOWSHIP VISIT TO CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL

On a beautiful sunny Monday 7th April, we drove to Chichester and assembled at the Buttery coffee house, just outside the cathedral precincts, for a reviving drink. Then we walked through the grounds to the west door entrance, where we were met by our guides for our tour.

In 1075, following the Norman conquest, the Normans decided that the seat of the bishop should be moved from Selsey to Chichester and construction started. This year is the



950th anniversary of the start of construction. This was in the Norman style, and over the years, many additions have been made in different styles, particularly Gothic.

This cathedral has often been used for a variety of artistic exhibitions.

In the south transept, we were shown two vignettes dating from the 1530's, and painted on oak planks, depicting the history of the cathedral and including King Henry VIII. Also, we saw a set of portraits of English monarchs.

In the Quire and behind the high altar is a 7-panel woven tapestry designed by John Piper and installed in 1996. The tapestry is in bright colours and has had mixed reviews ever since its unveiling and indeed amongst our party.

Moving behind the tapestry we were shown a stained-glass window commissioned by the Dean in 1975 from Marc Chagall, the French artist who took as his theme psalm 150 – 'let everything that has breath praise the Lord'. Many visitors come just to see this window.



After our tour, we enjoyed a lunch in a private room at the cathedral refectory, followed by a walk around the extensive Bishops Palace Gardens, which concluded a most enjoyable day.

acclaimed albums with *Clive Gregson with many, varied and successful collaborations since: Daphne's Flight; Hell Bent Heaven Bound; Wild Honey Orchestra; Iain Matthews; Loudon Wainwright III; solo and duo work with a further 15 albums and counting!*

Christine & Dave recorded a session for *The Paul Jones Radio Two* show in 1994. A fan gave Dave a copy of that recording. Dave thought it sounded great and forwarded a copy to Christine. This resulted in a decision to get together again and do some more shows.

Their material is drawn from both their musical backgrounds, but mainly covering songs which they both love but have not previously had an opportunity to perform, within their usual formats. FROM MERROW C of E INFANT SCHOOL

Dear Friends,

We have been very busy at Merrow Infants getting out and enjoying the beautiful weather in the run up to our Easter holidays. The year 2 children had a fantastic day at the Wintershall Lent Retreat, learning about the events of Holy Week in the beautiful setting of the estate; thank you to St John's for their contribution to the trip.

Our Easter Pause day began with our walk to St John's, where Rev'd Tim, Georgie & Mrs Boxer talked to us about Palm Sunday. The year 2 children then had a special treat as recounted here by Jack & Alma.

'On Tuesday we went to St. John's and sang our Easter songs. We had written a prayer and read it out in the service. We made resurrection rolls - we used oil, spice and sugar, with a marshmallow that represented Jesus. When the marshmallow melted, it was showing that Jesus had disappeared from the tomb and the pastry around the marshmallow was for the cloths around his body. We then thought about something we are sorry about and wrote it on some special paper. When we put it in the water, it dissolved - showing that when we are sorry to others, they will forgive us.'

The Open the Book Team came in and told us the story of John baptising Jesus. The part about John eating the bugs made a particular impression on our Reception children!

As we returned to school on April 22 it was Earth Day. The whole school went outside during the afternoon, making sure the lights were switched off inside our empty classrooms, and took part in a variety of activities, from chalk artwork, making seed bombs, creating models from recycling and planting seeds and plants.

The summer term is one we love, for the opportunities it brings to get outside, consolidate all our learning and look forward to what may come next. However, it can also be long and tiring - it brings with it a considerable workload for all the staff. We are grateful for your continued prayers and support.

GARDENING HINTS FOR MAY

After an unusually dry March and April, we can now look forward to warmer times. This is a busy month of catching up, but do not be too impatient planting out tender plants and summer bedding, as frost is always just around the corner! It is better to wait until the end of the



month or you might be paying a return visit to the Garden Centre or Nursery!

All plants should be hardened off outside before planting.

Dahlia plants and tubers should not be planted until at least the middle of the month.

Allow Forget-me-nots to set seed before pulling up.

Spray Roses with a systemic insecticide to control Blackspot and Greenfly.

Sweet Peas should be tied to support as they climb.

Winter flowering Heathers should be clipped after flowering.

Support tall perennials, such as Delphiniums and Lupins, with stakes.

Remove the dead blooms of Daffodils, Hyacinths and Tulips once they have finished flowering, leaving the leaves to die back and feed the bulbs for next year's flowers.

Hostas can be divided as they come into growth.

Fuchsia cuttings which have been rooted indoors should have their growing tips pinched out to encourage bushy growth.

Increase the rate of watering, and start to feed Houseplants.

Evergreen hedges should be clipped.

Keep newly planted trees and shrubs well-watered, especially during dry spells.

There is still time to sow Courgettes and Squash, two seeds to a pot, for planting out later. Sow the seed standing on its edge for better germination.

French and Runner beans can now be sown outdoors.

Kale, Leeks and Purple Sprouting should be sown, for harvesting next winter.

Pinch out the tips of Broad Beans to control Blackfly.

Plant out Tomatoes towards the end of the month - as they grow, remove side shoots from all types, except Bush and small fruited varieties.

Make small successional sowings of Salad Crops.

Continue to mow the lawn regularly, apply a Spring and Summer dressing, just before rain is forecast.

I am hoping that the light symbolised by the candle will help me see my way to becoming a stronger Christian, being more supportive of those in greater need.

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK - 11th to 17th May

In the April magazine, I wrote about Amelia and her family in Guatemala and you can see a picture of her and her daughter on the cover this month.



Guatemala is a hunger hotspot. At 46.5%, the country has one of the highest global rates of stunting in children. In some areas, this rises to 90%. Stunting permanently affects both physical and mental development. Meanwhile, more than half of the people in Guatemala work in agriculture. In the Alta Verapaz region, where Amelia lives, dependency on agriculture is the highest in the country. Heartbreakingly, malnutrition in children under five is also at the highest here.

Guatemala is among the 10 countries in the world rated most vulnerable to disasters and climate emergencies. The cruel truth is that Indigenous communities like Amelia's have done the least to cause the climate crisis, yet they endure its impact the most.

JOINING IN PALM SUNDAY CELEBRATIONS AT THE COPTIC CATHEDRAL IN ASWAN, EGYPT

Coptic Christians are an indigenous Christian ethno-religious group in Egypt, considered the largest Christian community in the Middle East. They are believed to be direct descendants of ancient Egyptians and primarily follow the Coptic Orthodox Church. Estimates suggest they make up around 10% of Egypt's population, with some sources citing a range of 5% to 15%.

We were priviledged to observe their Palm Sunday service in Aswan at the Coptic Cathedral during our recent travels, and here is what we experienced..



After passing our

bags through the usual x-ray scanners, we entered the walled courtyard in front of the cathedral. There were masses of people there, of all ages, mostly young people, in a festive, happy mood. We walked up the steps to the cathedral and the doors were welcomingly open. People were freely walking in and out of the service whilst it was happening, so we felt we could join them by standing at the back. The cathedral was packed, and we observed that men and women were seated and standing separately. The children had made their palm fronds into the most beautiful shapes, including crowns, and everyone joined in singing psalms and responses to prayers. The service was in arabic, so we couldn't really understand everything happening, but it still felt familiar. It was quite busy with the movement of people in and out of church but the focus was on the service.

As we left the service, we were approached by a lady in the Cathedral shop who explained the coptic cross to us - the typical form of the 'Coptic cross' used in the Coptic Church is made up of two bold lines of equal length that intersect at the middle at right angles. Each line

terminates in three points, representing the Trinity of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Altogether, the cross has 12 points symbolizing the Apostles, whose mission was to spread the Gospel message throughout the world.

It was lovely to share the experience of Palm Sunday with Christians in another country, but we also missed being with

country, but we also missed being with you all at St John's!




The guest editors generally produce two

- responds to new requests for advertising and liaises with the advertisers to help them prepare their copy if necessary.
- uses Microsoft Word to insert, move around and delete adverts as required into the existing magazine template.
- invoices advertisers when their advert has appeared and issues repeat invoices to regular advertisers once a year. This has been done manually up to now by email but the church has just bought new bookkeeping software which the adverts manager will be able to use in future.
- checks with the treasurer that payments have been received. This will happen automatically with the new system.
- thanks advertisers for paying.

A St. John's parishioner asks, "What's the Cathedral ever done for us?" So, I contacted Guildford Diocese and, while we await their reply, I found the following:-

Seat of the Bishop: The cathedral is the church where the bishop's "cathedra" (Latin for "chair") is located, signifying the bishop's authority and leadership within the diocese.

Mother Church of the Diocese: The primary church for the entire diocese, acting as a centre for worship, mission, and leadership.

Place of Worship & Celebration: Where major celebrations of faith & life take place, including services, festivals and other significant events.

Cultural & Historical Landmark: Cathedrals are often important cultural & historical landmarks, reflecting the region's heritage and spiritual life.

Public Church: Cathedrals are public churches, there to proclaim the gospel.

Registered Charities: Governed by the Charity Commission & Church Commissioners.

What Cathedrals do for their Parishes: Support Diocesan Ministry: Cathedrals work in and serve the diocese, supporting the Diocesan Bishop's ministry.

Focal Point for Diocesan Activities: For services and celebrations for those worshipping in churches throughout the diocese.

Pastoral Care: Cathedral clergy are available to all in the parish for pastoral or spiritual support.

Welcoming Environment: For parishioner's baptisms, marriages, or funerals.

Mission & Outreach: Cathedrals reach out to their local and wider communities through their presence, worship, and varied work.

Spiritual Leadership: The bishop, as the leader of the diocese, presides over the cathedral and provides spiritual guidance to the parishes within the diocese.

Cathedrals are also parishes: and have legal and pastoral responsibilities for their parishioners.

So there's the answer!
