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






M-i-F Adventure in Chilworth – 28th September 2024

The Men-in-Fellowship broke the mould by making September, rather than November, their Gunpowder Trip.



The Chilworth Gunpowder Mills were their target and led by chief conspirator, Mark Harrington, twelve of us set off furtively from the Percy Arms on a brilliantly sunny Saturday morning to explore the ruins of this industry that once thrived on the banks of the River Tillingbourne. Gunpowder had been manufactured along the river since 1626 - up to as late as 1920. Blessed with a strong flow of water to drive the mills and an abundant supply of alder trees for charcoal, the mills employed some 600 workers at their height. We viewed the ruins of the mills, the waterways for transporting the gunpowder to the River Wey and the protective mounds which tried to shield workers from the ever-present danger of explosions. Regretfully these were aplenty with loss of life and, in 1727, a blast which destroyed even the church on St. Martha's Hill.

We navigated these hazards safely, finally emerging at the haven of The Percy Arms for a good fellowship lunch, happy in the knowledge that the mills are a Scheduled Ancient Monument managed by English Heritage.

Deficit budgets: The cost to stay alive

In early September CAP released their latest report: "Deficit Budgets - the cost to stay alive", which shines a light on the brutal reality that over 11 million people are now trying to live off a budget that isn't enough to meet their essential needs. I know that you, like me, find it just as heartbreaking to see people accessing our services and yet still struggling with a budget that simply won't balance, despite our and their best efforts. Isolation, disempowerment, deteriorating mental wellbeing and physical health are all highlighted as awful impacts of a deficit budget – and many here in Guildford need the hope, love and care that CAP, working with churches such as yours, can provide. I wonder why some people are reluctant to volunteer these days? Yes, people have busy lives and their lives are stressful, but people have always had busy lives.

The Good Samaritan did not phone 999, or St John's and say, "Oh by the way I saw this bloke who was wounded on the road to Jericho can you sort him out?" He actively got the man to an inn and got his wounds attended to and agreed to pay for his lodgings until he was well enough to leave. At the end of the parable, Jesus says "Now which of these three do you think seemed to be a neighbour to him who fell among the robbers?" The lawyer said, "He who showed mercy on him." About our Cathedral......



Archdeacon of Sunderland to be new Dean of Guildford.

The Venerable Robert (Bob) Cooper, Archdeacon of Sunderland, has been appointed as the new Dean of Guildford. The official appointment, which has been approved by the King, will be followed by an installation

at our Cathedral on 26 January 2025.

Born and raised in Lancashire, Bob studied theology at the Universities of Aberystwyth and Nottingham. He has a passion for mission, church growth and social justice, having played leading roles in prison chaplaincy and as part of his local board of education. Bob Cooper will be our Cathedral's sixth Dean.

Despite coming from the Diocese of Durham almost 300 miles away, there are strong links in the very brickwork of Guildford Cathedral, with the Jarrow Stone plaque honouring the philanthropic efforts of Surrey in supporting Jarrow, Co Durham during the economic depression of the 1930s.

Bob, who is married to Kate Cooper and has four children, has served as Archdeacon of Sunderland since 2018. During his time there he championed under-represented communities to address issues including urban and rural poverty.

He will take on his new role as our Cathedral fast approaches its 65th anniversary and looks to the future.

Speaking of his appointment, Bob Cooper, Dean Designate

said: "I am excited to be starting this new chapter at Guildford Cathedral and to help grow numbers and outreach to all. There is a fantastic mission potential in this town and diocese, and I'd like to pay tribute to my predecessors, Dianna Gwilliams and Stuart Beake for their leadership and ministry. While Guildford may have different issues and challenges to Durham, I look forward to continuing my focus in championing those people whose voices struggle to be heard, and ensuring the word of God inspires every connection and interaction the Cathedral has with our communities."

Gardening hints for November

The planting of tulips should be completed by the end of this month.

Cut down faded perennials leaving penstemon and other late flowering perennials to continue flowering. If you do not want to risk frost damage to dahlias and cannas by overwintering them in the ground, they should be lifted, dried and stored in a frost-free place ready for planting next spring. If they are being overwintered in the ground they should be covered with a mulch dressing. Apply an application of a mulch dressing to protect agapanthus from the frost.

Stand pots and containers on feet to prevent waterlogging. Half-hardy fuchsias and pelargoniums should be cut back and brought undercover. Watering should be reduced so that they remain dormant during the winter months.

Bare root roses should be planted this month. The roots should be plunged into a bucket of water overnight and planted in a mixture containing bonemeal, and compost. Complete the pruning of climbing roses and reduce the height of bush roses to prevent wind rock during the winter months.

Continue to sow sweet peas under glass or indoors. Once they produce two pairs of leaves they should be pricked out into 3" pots and then placed into a cold frame or frost-free place to continue growing slowly. Oriental grasses should be left until the spring before being trimmed back.

This is a good month for taking hard wood cuttings of shrubs, they should be 6"-8" long with the top cut angled to shed water just below a pair of buds; the lower cut should be straight just above a pair of buds. Push the cuttings into a deep pot filled with compost - the cuttings should be pushed in around the edge of the pot with the angled cut uppermost. Water the compost and then place the pots in a frost-free place to overwinter.

Amaryllis bulbs should be potted up for Christmas flowering. Bring potted hyacinths into a light cool area once they begin to shoot.

Reduce the watering of houseplants so that the soil surface is dry but the roots are slightly moist. Give the plants plenty of light but do not leave them close to a window on frosty nights.

Now is a good time to plant raspberry canes, fruit trees and bushes. Start the winter pruning of apple and pear trees. Aquadulce broad beans should be planted now to produce an early crop ahead of the spring invasion of blackfly. Garlic cloves can still be planted.

The grass should be cut on warm dry days with mower blades set on a higher setting. Try to keep off the lawn when it is frosty. Continue to rake fallen leaves off the lawn.

Breast Screening over the age of 70

Did you know that you can request Breast Screening every three years after the age of 70?

The NHS Breast Screening Programme invites all women registered with a GP for breast screening every 3 years from 50 to 70. Breast screening can detect cancers at an early stage before they can be felt but not all cancers are visible on mammograms and you should always remain Breast Aware for any changes.

There are risks as well as benefits to screening after the age of 70 and many women choose not to take it up so appointments are not routinely offered. However, you can request screening every 3 years by contacting your local Breast Screening Centre - in Guildford it is the Jarvis Centre and you can phone them for an appointment on 0333 200 2062.

Breast cancer is more common with age and 1 in 3 breast cancers occur after the age of 71. However, over diagnosis at screening is also more common. This is where changes of breast cancer are detected which might not have become apparent in your lifetime resulting in unnecessary treatment and concern. It is up to individual women to decide whether they wish to have screening but it is available free on request if you would like to have it.
